ARE YOU READY FOR THE NEW FINANCIAL YEAR?

At the time of writing, the decision is still to be made as to how, when or even if, the UK will leave the EU. So, for the present, uncertainty remains certain. What we do know, whatever the outcome, farms will need to become more competitive to remain sustainable in the long-term.

Whilst this message is hardly a new one and ideas on how to put this into practice are far from novel. A change in actual behaviour is still lacking on many, although not all farms, hence the need to continue to talk about this topic.

Influencing your farm performance by making good decisions rather than worrying about issues out of your farm control is the only practical and productive way forward. With the advent of a new financial year, there is no better time to put in place enhanced financial monitoring to review what you are currently doing.

Budget Monitoring

A recent survey carried out by European Dairy Farmers suggests that less than 50% of those who create a budget actually compare their prediction against their actual cash flow on a monthly basis.

A budget should really be treated as a working document and updated on a monthly basis to identify where and why there are variances (both favourable and adverse). Prudent financial planning requires taking into account the inevitability of change, to respond and adjust plans in a timely way. Take corrective action if targets are not being met and adapt the budget as your financial situation changes.

Prudent financial planning will build flexibility into maintaining and developing a business. SOUTH WEST DAIRY DEVELOPMENT CENTRE UPDATE

It is nearly twelve months since the cows arrived at the Agri EPI Centre's South West Dairy Development Centre, designed and operated by Kingshay. They are very settled in their state-of-the-art housing and as we emerge into Spring, will soon be enjoying their precision grazing. The network of cow tracks and the grazing gate system control their access to the A, B and C zones for eight hours each so that they get three fresh paddocks every day.

The cows are currently averaging 190 days in milk, giving 26.2 litres a day at an average 4.6% fat and 3.6% protein, on 2.7 milking's a day through the robot milkers. A small spring calving group are being introduced with fifteen heifers, which are due to calve in March to bring the herd up towards the 180 cow target.

Since January when we fully opened the visitor centre, built with sponsorship from Barbers Cheesemakers, ForFarmers, Galebreaker Agri, GEA and Zoetis, we have welcomed over 300 visitors. We are looking forward to welcoming many more in the future, especially at our open day on June 5th.

The South West Dairy Development Centre has opened it's meeting room and is now available to hire!

The room overlooks the working farm, whilst hosting meetings in a conference or board room style and can hold up to 50 people.


The South West Dairy Development Centre is opening its doors to farmers on Wednesday 5th June 2019.



HIGHER MILK YIELDS CONTINUING THIS WINTFR

Kingshay Dairy Manager herds are continuing to show high milk yields this Winter up 0.9% at 8,326 litres per cow this year, compared to 8,255 litres last year.

A slight decrease in milk prices for January 2019 was seen compared to the previous year (29.27ppl compared to 30.11ppl last year). Concentrate prices for January 2019 were £246 per tonne, a 11.8% increase compared to January 2018 when it was £220 per tonne. Feed costs have increased by 7% to 9.03ppl, this has resulted in a 6%decrease on monthly margins per litre, of 1.41ppl.

Yield from forage per cow has increased by 7% to 7.3 litres per cow per day in January 2019 compared to January 2018 when it was 6.8 litres. For full results go to www.kingshay.com/dairy-costings/latest-results/

KINGSHAY CONSULTANT PAUL ROBINSON SHARES HIS PASSION FOR TRANSITION COW MANAGEMENT

Managing the transition cow is one of the most critical parts of milk production and yet it still can be overlooked. Working with Premier Nutrition on their Transition Management System (TMS) has highlighted many areas, which require further improvement. The daily requirements of the close up dry cow of 1200g MP and 120 MJ ME are reasonably adhered to, but what about feeding 5.5 to 6.0kg NDF/head per day? When you go on farm and ask if they are eating a full diet, the answer is often, Yes! How do we really know? Rumen fill is a pretty good indicator and early evidence is showing that a dry cow with a consistent rumen fill of 4 or 5 could produce up to 5 litres/day more peak milk than a dry cow at rumen fill 3. This has a practical implication in trough design, push ups, finely chopped straw and feed space amongst others. Go out and monitor rumen fill and intakes closer.
