With appropriate permission provided by individual farmers, a link from BCMS gives a "My Herd Today" overview of cattle numbers and a link from Kingshay's Dairy Manager

includes monthly and rolling results with charts highlighting trends. Further developments include data links from feed companies, milk recording organisers, vets, as well as farm assurance reviews.

The app has already received positive feedback from farmer members, providing a near instant track of performance, leading to more informed decision making and facilitate discussion between farmers and their advisors.

SOUTH WEST DAIRY DEVELOPMENT CENTRE UPDATE

Early April saw the cows go out to graze for the first time since their arrival at the South West Dairy Development Centre, funded by Agri-EPI, designed and operated by Kingshay. With one of the main objectives of the Dairy Centre to integrate robotic milking with precision grazing – this was a hugely momentous occasion.

The grazing platform is subdivided into four zones, which the cows access via a network of tracks, controlled by a grazing gate system. This gate sends them to a measured paddock for around six hours before switching to a fresh area for the


next six hours and so on. The cows are free to come back to be milked when they choose. As can be expected, when faced with the unfamiliar, the cows "tested the system" to start with, but are adjusting to it well as the season progresses.

The tracks themselves are made of crushed stone or concrete sleepers. In both cases, they have AstroTurf laid on top to make for a comfortable and very cost-effective walking surface. Some grass areas were cut for first cut and are now being brought into the grazing round.

The cows are now international TV stars after being featured on several BBC and ITV programmes and most recently on Reuters TV, which syndicated their footage worldwide to a potential audience of over 700 million people! This is thanks to the involvement of the dairy as a test bed for the 5G Rural First project, which is examining the potential of the next generation of mobile signal to enhance connectivity in farming and rural areas.

DAIRY MANAGER UPDATE

The dry summer took its toll on somatic cell counts last year with a high peak of 183,000 cells in August, 6% higher than the same month in 2017. Although the annual average was very similar to 2016-17 and 2015-16 at 162,000 cells, only 4,000 cells higher than 2017-18.



This reversal from the gradual falling trend over the last few years was most likely due to the high peak in July/August coinciding with the hot weather. Cows were possibly lying (and dung-ing) in shadier areas, where flies are more prolific, potentially transferring disease from cow to cow. Heat stress was also rife last summer, which, along with nutritional stress, compromised immune function resulting in the cow not being able to cope with disease as easily. Organic farms saw a very comparable trend.

RECENT MAILINGS

As the days start to get longer, it is time to turn our attention to fly control. As we all know the seasons can be variable and so it is worth being prepared to treat from March through to October, should climatic conditions require. Flies are not only a nuisance to cows and staff, they carry bacteria and viruses.

20 YEARS OF COSTINGS!


This year marks the 20th year of Dairy Manager costings at Kingshay. From an initial group of 50 loyal members, several of whom are still using our costings, the service is now offered both direct to farmers and through many partner companies and used monthly by almost 2,000 herds across the UK.

Over the last 2 decades, boy have things changed! Herd size has grown by 43% taking the average herd

from 118 cows up to 205, but have we reached the top, with a 3-cow reduction in

herd size in 2019, or is it more likely an impact of last year's challenging summer?

Milk yield has followed a similar upward trend with herds being more efficient then ever at



producing milk. However, where that milk comes from has been very static for several years, in particular the amount of milk produced from grazing. What is the potential? Could more milk come from grazing for those herds that do graze? Limited grass availability, due to the hot summer, is the likely cause of a drop-in milk from grazing in 2019, resulting in an increase in concentrates and other feed sources being fed.

Milk price has been at its highest for the last 4 years at an average of 29.0p/ltr compared to 24.2p/ltr back in 2016, but is still below the peaks of 2014, unlike most cost areas have risen since then.

Look out for Kingshay's eighth edition of the annual Dairy Costings Focus Report, which will be available soon. The report views milk price trends to March 2019, ranking results by yield from forage, yield band and herd size from Dairy Manager costed herds. The report also incorporates additional results from Kingshay's Health Manager service, including fertility performance and cell counts.

"IN MY FIELD" BY SIMON SMITH DON'T BLAME THE MILKING RATION!!

Simon Smith is one of the Kingshay Team of Associate Consultants based in Buckinghamshire.

In my experience, too much emphasis is placed on the production diet and not enough focus on the dry cow rations. A poorly prepared cow entering the milking herd is no different to a Harry Kane or an Owen Farrell starting the new season without a preseason program. Poor performance is generally down to poor preparation in most walks of life and the same goes for dairy cow nutrition.

Time again when I visit farms to "firefight" the usual problem of the — "cows aren't milking as expected" or "they aren't getting in calf as they should be", I end up turning my attention to the dry cow protocol rather than throwing more money at the milking diet by introducing yet more very expensive miracle cure supplements. All too often these miracle cures will only compound the main issue of the cows not having the appetite or capacity to consume enough of the fresh cow mix. Brought about by either being too fat or suffering from subclinical metabolic issues or more commonly a combination of both caused by a poor pre-calving regime. In such circumstances, they cost you a lot of money and achieve nothing, so please spend as much time on the dry formulation as you do on the milking cow diet and prepare your cows for success!!
