WHAT DOES THE FUTURE HOLD?

With only six months until Friday 29th March 2019 when the UK leaves the EU, there is still huge uncertainty on what the post-Brexit food and farming policy and trading conditions will look like. The next six months, however, could hold all-together different and more immediate challenges for dairy farmers, brought on by the trials of the previous 9-months.

The year had certainly been one of discernible seasons, with much of the country having seen snow over the winter/early spring and an exceptionally hot summer, challenging grass growth for both grazing and silaging alike

Kingshay reacted quickly to produce an *insight* publication on Dealing with Hot Weather - for farmers signed up for the *DAIRY insight* Service – looking at what additional considerations needed to be taken into account due to the unprecedented conditions.

As a result of the weather, milk quality was also affected. Many producers

experienced drops in FPD levels – the Freezing Point Depression *insight* publication was timely for many farmers to provide solutions to the issue.

While milk yields have held up well, data from **Kingshay's Dairy Manager** (graph over page) shows milk from forage has been running at its lowest levels for some years following the cold weather in April, exacerbated by the heat and drought conditions. Increased concentrate use and higher feed prices have eroded some of the benefits of recent milk price gains.

Going forward, margins are likely to be further challenged by higher concentrate prices while grass silage stocks for many are low. All this combined with variable maize crops, means that the outlook for the winter is uncertain. However, help is at hand...

How can you be sure you have sufficient feed to see your cows throught to spring turnout?



FERTILITY FOCUS

When comparing dairy herd costs to last year, a significant change came from the cost of sub optimal fertility. Although the main fertility indicators showed a year on year improvement, the negative effect on production of extended lactations combined with higher milk prices have outweighed any advantages gained from this improvement. For the year ending July

2018, the true cost of infertility increased by 41 pence per day for every day that calving interval is extended. Overall, this now equates to £4.76 per extra day of calving interval.

Currently the UK median for calving interval is 402 days, while the top 25% run at 389 days (NMR 500 herd KPI survey). For a typical 200 cow Holstein Friesian herd achieving 8,500 litres per cow, the financial benefit of reducing calving interval from the average to top 25% performance is £12,376, driven mainly by increased milk sales value.

This clearly indicates that the overall economic impact of poorer reproductive performance, and the associated financial losses are greater as milk prices increase. Reproductive performance continues to be the major reason for culling in the UK herd as shown in this year's Dairy Costings Focus Report, accounting for over 25% of culls. For many farms, using sires with strong fertility indices will deliver benefits through the direct milk sales increases associated with reduced calving interval but also through cost reductions on replacements, services and veterinary costs.



DAIRY COSTINGS FOCUS REPORT

The seventh Dairy Costings Focus Report highlights key trends for the year ending March 2018. Milk prices, and therefore farm returns, have improved sharply over the past year but higher feed costs pose a risk according to the report.

The report reveals that average margins over purchased feed increased from 16.83p/litre last year to 21.21p/litre in the year to March 2018. This was mostly due to a 5.14p/litre increase in milk price, to average 28.78p/litrea welcome and necessary improvement after the very challenging low milk price period. However, higher feed costs eroded some of these gains, so it remains important to focus on efficiencies.
